MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Dear Residents of Baltimore County,

As I reflect on FY24, I am filled with gratitude and admiration for the accomplishments we have achieved together—many of those listed throughout the pages of this annual report. I have the honor to lead an organization that prioritizes innovation, growth and



inclusivity for the residents of Baltimore County. Our strategic plan, Building Community for a Better Tomorrow, continues to guide us as we take bold steps toward success. This past October, we proudly celebrated the 75th anniversary of our library system, a moment to honor our past while building on our momentum toward a brighter future.

Throughout FY24, we focused on meeting the evolving needs of our communities, ensuring that we serve everyone through an equity lens. We recognize that access to essential services is critical for all, regardless of socioeconomic status. Beyond providing access to traditional resources and services, we offered summer lunches and after-school snacks for children, access to legal services and gave away Chromebooks to qualifying residents. We also launched services to new Americans through outreach, ESOL and business programs and introducing early learning kits in Spanish. The libraries of the 21st century are essential to providing all community members with a fulfilling and healthy quality of life.

As we embrace new initiatives, we are too often reminded of the limitations posed by outdated buildings and furnishings. A key priority in my leadership agenda is to modernize and refresh our facilities to better serve you. I am pleased to report that all 19 of our branches saw improvements in FY24. Of particular note is the \$7 million renovation of the Catonsville Branch, which features two state-of-the-art recording studios. This project was partially funded by a \$3.5 million grant from the Marland State Library. In May, we announced a \$41 million project in partnership with Recreation and Parks to build a new community center along the Liberty Road corridor in the coming years. We are also preparing for a \$22 million renovation and expansion of the Woodlawn Branch, set to begin in FY25. You have my commitment to continue focusing on these capital improvements, ensuring that our spaces are modern, accessible, flexible and inclusive.

These investments—both large and small—are a direct investment in the people who use them. Every resident of Baltimore County deserves access to the best library facilities, no matter their zip code or income level. I am deeply grateful to the Baltimore County Government and the State of Maryland for recognizing the vital role libraries play in our community. I also want to express my appreciation to our Board of Library Trustees, the Foundation for Baltimore County Public Library and our Friends groups, all of whom support our vision, mission and goals.

While we are excited about the future, we remain focused on our core priority: Serving the residents of Baltimore County and making it a better place to live, work and play. Thank you for entrusting us with this responsibility. The unwavering support of our community fuels our passion and inspires us to do our best every single day.






